Option A uses a present perfect (have waited), option B uses simple past (waited), option C uses a simple present (wait), and option D uses a present perfect continuous (have been waiting) that are inappropriate with the sentence; whereas option E suggests the past perfect continuous form (had been waiting) that is appropriate one. Option E is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 2**

The teacher and students has been appreciated for their team work.

- A. The teacher and students has been appreciated for their team work
- B. The teacher and students have been appreciated for their team work
- C. The teacher and students to have been appreciated for their team work
- D. The teacher and students to has been appreciated for their team work
- E. The teacher and students are been appreciated for their team work

**ANSWER: B****Explanation:**

This sentence has an error in the subject-verb agreement. When the subject is a plural the verb follows must also be plural, a singular verb cannot be used. Option A has a singular verb (has been) for a plural subject that is incorrect. Option B is correct by using an appropriate verb (have been) whereas other options have a false form of conjugation (to have been/ to has been/ are been). Option B is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 3**

Although India had committed himself to facing out the mining of asbestos, it has not kept it's word.

other options are all wrong by using inappropriate combinations of pronouns such as option A 'himself- if, option B 'itself- it', option C 'it self- it' and option E "itself- it'. Option D is the correct answer.

**ANSWER: D****Explanation:**

This sentence has an error in the place of pronoun. In the sentence a wrong possessive pronouns have been used, where it should be 'itself- its' as correctly used in the option

D. other options are all wrong by using inappropriate combinations of pronouns such as option A 'himself- if, option B 'itself- it', option C 'it self- it' and option E "itself- it'. Option D is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 4**

The facts are well known. About half of all Indian children are undernourished, more than half suffer from anemia, a similar proportion escapes full immunization.

This sentence has an error in the use of parallelism. When there are many ideas or things take place in a sentence, the conjunction 'and' must take place before the last idea or the thing as it is shown in the option E (About half of all Indian children are undernourished, more than half suffer from anemia, and a similar), whereas; other options are wrong by placing the conjunctions inappropriate places. Option E is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 5**

Employees expect to know who is going on within the organization, how their work fits in to the whole picture, and what the future holds in store.

**ANSWER: B****Explanation:**

This sentence has an error in the place of interrogative conjunction. The conjunction (who) in the sentence denotes persons rather than the activities of the organization; so the conjunction should refer the activity (what). Option A suggests the conjunction that denotes the person instead of activities. Option C has possessed two unapt conjunctions (who) in the place of 'what' and (what) in the place where a conjunction that refers to the way work has been done 'how'. Option D uses (what) an unapt conjunction in the place of 'how' that should refer to the way work has been done. Option E uses (who) a conjunction that refers persons in the place where a conjunction is needed to refer an element of future 'what'. Option B is correct holding all the conjunctions in their right places.

**QUESTION NO: 6**

"Both sides affirmed that for things to be good from now on, the relations and unity between the two should be further strengthened," he said

**ANSWER: C****Explanation:**

This sentence has an error by using the adjective (good) in the place its comparative form. When the adjective is used in a comparative notion the comparative form of the adjective has to be used as in the option C (to be better). The other forms (to be best/good/ more good/more better) that are suggested in the rest of the options are all wrong. Option C is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 7**

If you are part of the team and if the attitude of another member is affecting the quality of your work, do not hesitate to initiate action in them.

- A. do not hesitate to initiate action in them.
- B. do not hesitate to initiate action on them.
- C. do not hesitate to initiate action upon them.

**ANSWER: D****Explanation:**

This sentence has an error in the use of inappropriate preposition. The notion of the sentence suggests something to be done against a person so the preposition (against) will be suitable to the sentence. Option D uses the appropriate preposition that is suitable to the context, whereas others use inappropriate prepositions (in/ on/ upon/for them). Option D is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 8**

Anger is often inevitable, yet what we deal with it can determine if it could result in disaster or yield a calm even positive outcome.

- B. yet who we deal with it can determine if it could
- C. yet how we deal with it can determine if it could

**ANSWER: C****Explanation:**

This sentence has an error by using an inappropriate interrogative conjunction (what). This sentence needs a conjunction that refers to the means of dealing with the object (how). Option A uses a conjunction (what) that refers to the problem. Option B uses a conjunction (that) that refers to the person. Option D uses a conjunction (which) that refers to the problem. Option E does not use an interrogative conjunction (that). Option C uses an appropriate conjunction (how) that refers the means reaching out to the object; hence, option C is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 9**

Anti-social elements were said to have restored to booth capturing some areas. It was very disturbing that the police remained mute spectators when such incidents take place, he said.

- A. remained mute spectators when such incidents take place, he said.

**Explanation:**

This sentence has an error in verb-time agreement. When a past tense proceeds, the following verb must also be expected in the same tense. Option C uses past tense followed by past tense (remained mute spectators when such incidents took place) that is more appropriate than other tenses in other options (take place/ taken place/ taking place/ to be take place); hence, option C is the correct answer.

**QUESTION NO: 10**

One and half million barrels of oil flows every day through the pipeline, which stretches across 1,263 km of harsh terrain

- A. One and half million barrels of oil flows every
- B. One and an half million barrels of oil flows every
- C. One and the half million barrels of oil flows every
- D. One and a half million barrels of oil flows every
- E. One half million barrels of oil flows every

**ANSWER: D**

**Explanation:**

This sentence has an error by lacking an article before a quantitative adjective (one and half). There are two halves in one so an indefinite article must take place before the word 'half. Option A has no article in it. Option B uses an indefinite article (an) that is used before a word that starts with vowel sound. Option C uses the definite article (the). Option E uses an incorrect form of adjective (One half). Option D uses the correct article that is used before the word (One and a half) that starts with a consonant sound as 'half; hence, it the correct answer.
